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## REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF MANAGEMENT AND OF THE DIRECTOR FOR 1953.

AN interlude in the excavation programme, the resumption of which will be described below, has enabled the Institute in its fifth year to realize one of its cherished projects. It had always been hoped that the Director could devote a season to recording and surveying some of the superb monuments still above ground ; the chosen site of Alanya has been even more repaying than had been anticipated ; his account of Alanya will be found on another page.

### MEMBERSHIP OF COUNCIL OF MANAGEMENT :

Professor Garrod's retirement, as representative of the University of Cambridge, is a source of deep regret to all ; but the Council is fortunate in the appointment to replace her of Miss Munn-Rankin, who has already served as an Elected Member and is familiar with the business conducted by the Council.

The resignation of another member of Council, Mr. G. U. Spencer Corbett, owing to his taking up an appointment abroad, is much regretted by his colleagues.

### LECTURES IN LONDON :

The lecture programme was curtailed in 1953 as a measure of economy, but the two held were well attended by scholars from various fields and by many friends of the Institute. The subjects were :—

*Excavations and Travels in Turkey*, by Mr. Seton Lloyd, on 6th February, 1953.  
*The Importance of Southern Turkey for Early Byzantine Church Art and Architecture*,  
by Mr. Michael Gough, on 27th November, 1953.

Arrangements have been made for three lectures in the new year.

### JOURNAL :

Volume III has been for some time in the hands of subscribers and other purchasers. Volume IV is already being compiled.

### OCCASIONAL PUBLICATIONS, No. 2 :

This publication, announced in our previous issue, has now appeared : *The Alalakh Tablets*, by D. J. Wiseman. The book has received a warm welcome, and the debt which the Institute owes to the generous contributors mentioned in our Fourth Annual Report, has been augmented by a further donation of £100 from the Australian Institute of Archaeology through the good offices of its President, Mr. W. J. Beasley.

### FINANCE :

The result of the appeal to Academic Bodies for increased annual subscriptions has met a generous response which will be seen in the accounts of the current financial year when published in the next Annual Report.

In virtue of Turkish legislation, the annual rent of our headquarters at Ankara has been increased by £244 from the 1st January, 1954, with a retrospective payment of £180. Fortunately this extra charge is just covered from certain savings.

## LIBRARY :

During the year under review well over 100 books have been added to the Institute's library. Those purchased include important items such as Sarre and Herzfeld, *Archäologische Reise in Tigris und Euphrat-gebiet*; Dittenberger's *Orientis Graecae Inscriptiones Selectae* (1903); a set of the Beihefte from *Archiv für Orientforschung*; the publications of the Princeton Expedition to Syria (1914-30); Cuinet, *La Turquie d'Asie*; Smirnov, *Oriental Silver* (published by the Russian Imperial Archaeological Commission); A. J. B. Wace, *Mycenae* (1949); P. Dikaios, *Khirokitia* (1953); C. Blegen, *Troy, the Sixth Settlement* (1953); C. L. Woolley and R. D. Barnett, *Carchemish III* (1933), and many others. A duplicate card catalogue of the Library and a list of all books sent out are kept by the Hon. Librarian and may be consulted on request.

Exchanges with *Anatolian Studies* have been authorized, in addition to those previously reported, with the *Revue des Études Grecques*; publications of *Kungl. Vitterhets Historie och Antikvitets Akademien*, Stockholm; *Bulletin du Musée de Beyrouth*; and publications of the *Société Finlandaise d'Archéologie*, Helsinki. Others are under discussion.

## THE PROGRAMME FOR THE FUTURE :

The Institute looks forward to the resumption of excavations in 1954. While work on the important Islamic remains at Harran will be continued when Dr. Storm Rice returns from America, the Director's activities will be concentrated on a site which seems, both by reason of its situation and its character, to be of exceptional promise. Beycesultan, in the Meander Valley, is large enough to have been the provincial capital of an area densely populated in early times. On the summit are worked blocks which have features comparable with the masonry of Bogazköy: other blocks, plundered apparently from the settlement, have the same character. There are, however, some columns tapering from top to bottom among the latter, which recall the shape of Minoan pillars. The pottery indicates occupation during the 3rd and 2nd millennia but no later. Archaeologists have long realized the need to investigate these periods in the South-West, about which comparatively little is known, and the fact that many scholars locate there that important but enigmatic people of Arzawa, so often mentioned in Hittite records, is an additional incentive to exploration. History as well as archaeology may be enriched, and application has been made for permission to excavate.

## ANKARA :

During the year 1953 eighteen Students, Fellows and visiting Council Members have either used the Institute in Ankara as their headquarters or worked under its auspices for purposes of research in Turkey. One gratifying development observable after this fifth operational season has been the regular appearance in the field of the same workers. Both individuals and groups of scholars, committed to long-term programmes of Anatolian research, have, owing to the perennial character of their work, become integrated in the Ankara establishment, identifying themselves with its aims and contributing an element of continuity to the process of their attainment.

In this category are Mr. and Mrs. Michael Gough, who have completed a fifth season of recording Cilician monuments : Messrs. Macpherson and Mellaart have returned for the third successive season to work in the classical and Bronze Age spheres respectively, and a third successive expedition has been led by Miss Seton-Williams to the southern provinces in search of early sites. In another milieu, Dr. D. Storm Rice has thrice collaborated with the Director in the investigation and recording of Islamic monuments and the Walker Trust excavations in Istanbul have brought Professor D. Talbot Rice on a third visit to Turkey. At the same time there have been newcomers to the Anatolian field, and at Ankara the hostel accommodation has been filled to capacity throughout the season.

The Director's primary preoccupation during the summer was the expedition to Pamphylia for the recording of medieval monuments and inscriptions at and around Alanya. During the autumn months, advantage was taken of Dr. O. R. Gurney's presence in the Institute to consider and discuss historico-geographical and other aspects of the report and maps prepared by Mr. Mellaart in connection with his extensive survey of pre-classical sites in south-west Turkey. In this connection in September a short expedition was organised with the purpose of revisiting some of the major sites mentioned in the report, and it resulted in the recommendation of Beycesultan for excavation by the Institute in 1954.

The archaeological material obtained as a result of the 1951-52 excavations at Sultantepe has not been neglected, and some work has been done on the objects so far unpublished. In so far as the tablets are concerned, the installation of an electric kiln in the Ankara Museum has made the process of baking practicable, and the entire library has now been preserved in this way. Dr. Gurney was accordingly able to spend the months of October and November in refitting fragments and copying texts. Some unexpected discoveries made in this way will be reported by him elsewhere.

During the course of the year, some social entertaining was done in the Institute, and a number of prominent Ankara personalities enlisted as its friends and supporters. An experiment in November, whose success would justify its repetition in subsequent seasons, was an evening gathering of some twenty-five junior Turkish archaeologists from Ankara University and the staffs of the Museum and Antiquities Department. A small exhibition of photographs and drawings was arranged and coloured slides shown on a projector.

*The Alanya Expedition :*

The work at Alanya was undertaken in two separate campaigns ; a first period of five weeks in May/June and a second of three weeks in August. During July the Director returned to Ankara to attend to Institute affairs. While at Alanya he was fortunate in the collaboration of Dr. D. Storm Rice and was assisted for part of the time by the Institute Fellow, Mr. Michael Ballance.

The sea-fortress, constructed for the most part by the Seljuk Sultan Allahettin Kaykubad in the early years of the 12th century, was named after him Alâiyye. To-day the great rock projecting into the sea is encircled by nearly two miles of

well preserved fortifications. There are famous buildings such as the "Red Tower" and "Tersane", or ship-building galleries at its base, and at its summit other monuments, including two early Byzantine churches and a small monastery. By the help of air-photographs, obtained through the friendly co-operation of the Turkish air force, a detailed site-plan was constructed of the entire city: larger-scale architectural drawings were made of the twenty-eight principal buildings and elements in the fortifications by the Director himself: more than a score of Arabic and Persian inscriptions were photographed (when necessary telescopically) by Dr. Rice, and are being collated and studied by him. In the architectural field also, nearly 400 photographs were taken by Dr. Rice, and a great many successful colour-transparencies made. Finally, measured drawings and photographs were made of all the Seljuk buildings at subsidiary sites in the neighbourhood; *medreses* at Oba and Guleşen; a castle and caravanserai at Alara and others on the old highroad to Konya.

The work of the survey was continued under difficulties during the second part of the campaign in August, on account of abnormally high temperatures and humidity. The whole enterprise was, however, completed as planned and visits made to some further stations on the Konya road.

#### *Excavations :*

The *Walker Trust* excavations in the Palace of the Byzantine Emperors at Istanbul were resumed under the direction, first of Professor D. Talbot Rice and later of Mr. J. B. Ward Perkins, from the last week in April until mid-July. The staff included Messrs. G. U. S. Corbett, D. Oates, M. Scott and Miss Ann Wilson. A report on the results, including the discovery of new mosaics, will be the subject of a lecture to the Society of Antiquaries.

#### *Activities of Fellows, Students and others :*

*Dr. O. R. Gurney* arrived in Turkey in mid-September in time to take part in the reconnaissance, organized by the Director, of Bronze Age sites in the area selected for research in 1954. During October and November he worked in the Ankara Museum, copying and supervising the repair of the Sultantepe tablets.

*Dr. D. Storm Rice* collaborated with the Director in the survey of medieval Alanya during May and June. He afterwards left for London, *en route* to America, where he is at present fulfilling a one-year's lecturing appointment at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor.

*Mr. and Mrs. Michael Gough* returned in early July to their survey of ancient monuments in Cilicia, and remained there till the end of August. The work of recording sculptures and inscriptions at Bodrum was first carried a stage further. The survey of Ayaş (Elaeusa Sebaste) was then continued and the clearance completed of the mosaic pavement discovered in the previous year. The camp was finally transferred to the region of Mut and Alahan, where much architectural recording was done and discoveries made of new frescoes, mosaics and sculpture.

*Mr. Ian Macpherson* arrived in Ankara at the beginning of April and from that time until mid-September used the Institute as headquarters while he continued his epigraphic survey of the Galatian Province. Having been provided with a car by the Scarborough Committee, he benefited greatly from increased mobility and could improve the scope and thoroughness of his work accordingly. The result was a very large crop of new inscriptions and the definitive investigation of large areas within the Province.

*Mr. Michael Ballance* (Institute Fellow for 1953-4) worked in Turkey from April to November, using the Institute as headquarters during a series of journeys connected with his study of ancient marble quarries. In addition to his prescribed programme of research, he found time to make interesting architectural recordings of Byzantine buildings at Antalya and elsewhere, as well as taking part in the Alanya survey and assisting Mr. Gough in his work in Cilicia.

*Mr. James Mellaart* (Institute Scholar for 1953-4) returned to Ankara in April after completing a mound-survey of the Jordan Valley on behalf of the Hashimite Government. A great part of the summer was spent by him in completing his report on the very extensive survey of south-western Turkey undertaken by him in the previous season, preparing maps and numerous pottery diagrams. He was assisted in this work by his fiancée, Miss A. Cenani, a pupil of Professor K. Bittel in Istanbul University. During the autumn months he took part in the Director's reconnaissance of major sites located during his previous survey, and undertook himself a further journey in the Aegean provinces in the hope of clarifying certain problems which had arisen from his previous work. Mr. Mellaart returns to Jordan for a winter campaign of work on behalf of the Antiquities Department.

*Miss V. Seton-Williams* returned to Turkey in July accompanied by *Miss J. du Platt Taylor* and *Miss M. Munn-Rankin*. Owing partly to the fact that the Turkish Majlis was no longer in session, a ministerial permit for the sounding which she had proposed to make could not be obtained within the limited time which she was able to spend in the country. Her party was, however, with the helpful assistance of the local authorities, able to carry out an alternative programme of archaeological reconnaissance and other work in the Gaziantep area.

*Mr. David Oates*, after completing his duties with the Walker Trust expedition in Istanbul was able to join Mr. Gough's party in Cilicia for some weeks and to offer the expedition valuable assistance. For a short time Mr. Gough was also assisted by *Mr. D. R. Wilson*. Other registered students who spent some time in Ankara during the course of their researches in Turkey included *Mr. Peter Hulin*, whose travels were being prolonged after assisting in Professor Mallowan's excavations at Nimrud and *Mr. I. J. C. Foster*.
